Democrat - 12th Middlesex



Ruth B. Balser is the State Representative for the 12th Middlesex District, which includes parts of Newton and Brookline. Now serving her thirteenth term in the House of Representatives, Representative Balser continues to be an independent progressive voice, fighting for the values and priorities of her community. Representative Balser serves as a member of House Speaker Mariano's leadership team as a Division Chair.

As the first psychologist to serve in the Massachusetts legislature, Representative Balser brings a unique perspective. She has made mental health public policy a top priority. She has championed many bills and budget amendments with the goal of expanding access to and quality of mental health and addiction services and reducing the stigma associated with these illnesses. She is credited with expanding mental health parity in Massachusetts, enactment of an omnibus children's mental health bill, and protecting behavioral health in health care reform legislation.

Jennifer Tracey is the Director of the Mayor's Office of Recovery Services, the first and only municipal substance use recovery office in the United States. The Mayor's Office of Recovery Services leads all substance use recovery policy and initiatives for the City of Boston. Jen holds a Master of Social Work from Salem State College and a bachelor's degree from Providence college.



**Senator John Keenan** 

Democrat - Norfolk and Plymouth

John was raised in Quincy, the fourth of seven children, and attended the Quincy Public Schools, graduating from North Quincy High School. John graduated with honors from Harvard in 1986, with a government concentration, and in 1989 graduated from Suffolk University Law School. A lifelong learner, in 2019, he graduated from the Harvard Kennedy School with a Master's Degree in Public Administration.

John was appointed to the Quincy City Council in 2003 and was elected Councilor at Large the following year. He served as Chairman of the Council's Finance Committee for eight years, and in 2010 was elected to the State Senate, where he proudly serves his hometown of Quincy, as well as Abington, Braintree, Holbrook, and Rockland. In the Senate, John has advocated for his district and has spearheaded legislative responses to public health issues, such as tobacco reform, substance use prevention, treatment and recovery, and mental health treatment access.

As the leader of Muhammad's Mosque No. 11, Randy Muhammad oversees the chapter's various ministries and study groups. In non-pandemic times, he delivers the Sunday sermon, Wednesday evening lectures, Friday night study groups and Saturday prayer services. The mosque has ministries in nine state prisons and runs a food pantry that distributes produce and dairy from local farms. The mosque also runs a science, technology, engineering, arts and math program for teens and has launched a new initiative to reach out to people experiencing homelessness and substance abuse in Nubian Square. Randy Muhammad is also the Executive Director of Torchlight Recovery.
